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Student Leadership Framework

Based on "The Student Leadership Challenge" by Barry Posner and James Kouzes.

At Bray Park State High School, student leaders are guided by the principles from The Student Leadership Challenge, focusing on five key practices that build effective, compassionate, and inspiring leaders. Each student leader exemplifies these practices, aligned with the school's vision of fostering a community of growth, inclusivity, and resilience.





Model the way

Bray Park student leaders set a positive example in all aspects of school life. Through consistent actions and a commitment to school values, they serve as role models, fostering a culture of excellence and respect. Key responsibilities under this practice include:

- Upholding and demonstrating school values, both academically and behaviourally.
- Leading by example during school events, sports, and community activities.
- Supporting school-wide initiatives, acting as ambassadors for the school's mission and motto, "Challenge the Unknown."

Inspire a shared vision

Student leaders work to unite peers around a common purpose, fostering school pride and a sense of community. They motivate students to contribute to a shared vision of inclusivity, resilience, and active participation. This includes:

- Communicating the importance of school pride through events and assemblies.
- Engaging students in shaping their school experience by gathering feedback and encouraging input.
- Promoting and organising initiatives that align with the school's core values and goals.

Challenge the process

Leaders at Bray Park embrace growth and innovation by seeking opportunities for improvement and overcoming obstacles. They demonstrate courage by addressing issues and advocating for student needs. Key actions include:

- Collaborating with school administration to introduce student-led initiatives.
- Innovating with event formats, extracurricular activities, and health programs.
- Encouraging feedback from students across year levels to explore new possibilities for improvement.



Enable others to act

Bray Park's student leaders foster collaboration and trust within the school community. They mentor younger students, encourage teamwork, and cultivate an inclusive environment that allows everyone to contribute. This practice involves:

- Organising and supporting inter-house competitions, fostering a strong house identity.
- Mentoring junior leaders and inspiring active involvement in school events.
- Working as a team of leaders to increase participation in school-wide programs and special events.

Encourage the heart

Bray Park leaders recognise achievements, celebrate efforts, and uplift the school spirit. By acknowledging both individual and group accomplishments, they build morale and foster a supportive community. Responsibilities here include:

- Celebrating student and team achievements at assemblies and special events.
- Recognising the efforts of volunteers, leaders, and participants in school initiatives.
- Organising and running annual events to honour contributions to the school community.

Key Events and Commitments for Bray Park Student Leaders

- School assemblies, sports carnivals, and inter-house competitions
- Annual Academic and Sports Awards Ceremony and cultural celebrations
- Student Council meetings and leadership planning sessions
- Weekly leadership meetings with school administration and staff
- Fundraising events, community functions, and Open Evenings
- Engagements with the wider community including STEM week, ANZAC ceremonies etc.
- Student engagement activities including lunch time clubs/activities

This framework guides Bray Park's student leaders in embodying exemplary leadership, making a positive impact within the school and beyond, and leaving a legacy for future students.



Student Leadership Structure

This structure organises student roles to foster a supportive, inclusive, and growth-oriented environment, enabling leaders to fulfil their responsibilities effectively and align with the school's vision.

Whole School Leadership Team

This team embodies the primary leadership roles, providing strategic direction and mentorship across the student body. Their responsibilities include setting the school's tone and modelling the way for all students.

School Captains (4 x Year 12 students)

Role: Represent the student body at internal and external events, mentor other student leaders, and lead initiatives that foster school pride. School captains organise and lead assemblies, coordinate with members of staff and administration, and guide overall student leadership efforts.

Student Council President (Year 12 student)

Role: Lead the Student Council, coordinate council meetings, and advocate for student interests. The student council president oversees Student Council initiatives, facilitates communication between students and administration, and manages fundraising and service projects.



Prefects (Year 12, 11 and 10 students)

Role: Senior students who support school events and help maintain a respectful environment. Prefects help to organise key school functions, mentor younger students, and assist with school standards. Prefects will also be involved in guiding/mentoring new students joining Bray Park.

House Captains (2 x Year 12s and 2 x Year 9s per sport house)

Role: Lead their respective houses in inter-house competitions, foster house spirit, and encourage participation in school sporting events.

Year 9 Student Leaders (4 x Year 9 students)

Role: Year 9 Student Leaders are students from Year 9 who demonstrate leadership potential and play an active role in school initiatives, supporting junior leaders and bridging the gap to senior leadership roles. They represent the junior year levels, gather student feedback, and help implement student council initiatives.

Year 9 Peer Mentors (Based on positions available)

Role: Year 9 students who support school events and help maintain a respectful environment. Year 9 Peer Mentors help to organise key school functions, mentor younger students, and assist with school standards. Year 9 Peer Mentors will also be involved in guiding/mentoring new students joining Bray Park.

Class Captains (Year 7 and 8 students - 2 leaders per House Group)

Role: Participate in leadership training and support school events, helping them gain experience for future roles. They represent specific home group classes and gather student feedback/concerns to take to student council meetings if required.





Specialised Leadership Team

These roles focus on specific areas of interest, promoting engagement in co-curricular and extracurricular activities. They allow students with unique talents to lead in their fields and foster a holistic school culture.

Sports Captains (2 x Year 12 students)

Role: Lead and encourage the sport culture at Bray, promote participation, and model good sportsmanship. Sports captains represent the school at sports events, organise sports carnivals, and collaborate with HPE staff on health/sport initiatives.

Co-Curricular Music Captain (Year 12 student)

Role: Lead and encourage the music culture at Bray and promote participation. The co-curricular music captain represents the school at music events, assists with the organisation of school music evenings, and collaborates with Arts staff on music initiatives.

Co-Curricular Leadership Positions (Tech Crew, Ensemble Leaders, Volleyball, Dance and Innovate)

Role: Lead within their co-curricular programs, encourage student participation, and represent the program at school events. Co-Curricular captains assist in event setup and execution, guide students within their specialty, and support integration of co-curricular activities into school life.

This structure aligns each level of leadership with their respective roles and The Student Leadership Challenge practices, encouraging students to model values, inspire peers, and collaborate in ways that benefit the entire school community.

Official leadership positions are not the only leadership opportunities at Bray Park SHS. Students also have other opportunities to gain leadership skills and strengthen their abilities such as the ABCN Emerging Leaders program and ABCN Women in Leadership Focus programs.







Student Leadership Timeline

(Year 11 and 12 Positions)

Overview

This timeline guides the process for student leadership selection, training, and transition at Bray Park SHS, ensuring that incoming leaders are well-prepared and aligned with the school's values and goals. Leaders will begin their roles in Term 4, allowing a smooth handover and preparation for the upcoming year.



Term 3 - Leadership Application and Selection Process

Week 1

Year 11 Leadership Camp.

Week 2

Leadership Launch Assembly: Announce student leadership positions, describe roles, and explain the
application process. Distribute application forms and provide an overview of expectations. Email whole
grade information and application form.

Week 3

- Application Period Opens: Applications for all year 11 and 12 leadership roles are open. Forms are distributed and made available online via QLearn for easy access.
- Promotion: Responsible staff member to encourage participation via house group notices, assemblies, and school communications. Current leaders to speak about their experiences as leaders to encourage potential applicants.

Week 5

- Application Deadline: All completed application forms, including supporting documentation, are due.
- Application Review: Selection committee (including school leaders, current student leaders, and staff) review applications and shortlist candidates.

Week 7-8

- Speeches: Students present leadership speeches to their year level and staff.
- Student and Staff Voting: Students and staff vote for students running for leadership positions, such as School Captains, after candidates deliver brief speeches.
- Interviews: Shortlisted candidates are invited for interviews with the selection panel (School Captains, Student Council President and Sport Captains).

Week 9

- Selection Announcement: Successful candidates are notified via letters and announced at a school assembly.
- Transition Training: New leaders attend orientation sessions with outgoing leaders, focusing on responsibilities, school values, assembly/student council handover and goal-setting.





Term 4 – Training, Handover, and Induction

Week 1-2

- · Leadership group announced at assembly.
- Leadership Training Day/Workshop: New leaders participate in a comprehensive training workshop covering teamwork, communication skills, and conflict resolution.
- Handover Meetings: Outgoing leaders meet with their successors to discuss specific roles, responsibilities, and any ongoing initiatives.

Week 3-4

 Goal Setting and Planning: Each leadership team (e.g., Student Council, House Captains, Sports Captains) develops goals for the upcoming year, focusing on school spirit, inclusivity, and student engagement.

Week 7

 Introduction at Academic Awards Night: New leaders are acknowledged at the Academic Awards night.

Week 4 the following year

• Investiture ceremony: New school leaders are formally introduced and facilitate the ceremony.

This timeline promotes a structured and supportive transition for Bray Park SHS's student leaders, ensuring continuity, accountability, and a legacy of positive school culture.

Week 7-8

- Year 7 and 8 Class Captains: Will be selected based on nominations from Home Group teachers and applications.
- Year 9 Peer Mentors, Junior House Captains and Co-Curricular Captains: Will be selected based on the application process.
- Year 10 Prefects and Year 9 Student leaders: Will be selected based on applications.

Week 9

- Selection Announcement: Successful candidates are notified via letters and announced at a school assembly.
- Transition Training: New leaders attend orientation sessions with outgoing leaders, focusing on responsibilities, school values, assembly/student council handover and goal-setting.

1. School Captains

Role Summary:

School Captains are year 12 students who represent the student body and are the face of the school at internal and external events. They lead by example, foster school spirit, and uphold Bray Park SHS values in all aspects of school life.

Responsibilities:

- Act as ambassadors for Bray Park SHS at school events, assemblies, and community functions, exemplifying the school's core values in behaviour and academic performance.
- Lead and mentor the student leadership team, fostering a positive school culture and guiding younger students by setting an example in academic, behavioural, and co-curricular engagement.
- Serve as a liaison between students, teachers, and school administration, communicating student concerns and ideas to the leadership team, including weekly meetings with the principal (Monday, first break).
- Collaborate with the Principal, Deputy Principals, and other staff to address issues affecting the student body and advocate for student needs.
- Organise and coordinate school events—assemblies, cultural celebrations, and social activities—working closely with other leaders to ensure smooth execution.
- Represent Bray Park SHS at external events, acting as ambassadors within the community.

2. Student Council President

Role Summary:

The Student Council President is a year 12 student who chairs the Student Council, representing student interests and ideas to the school administration and leading initiatives to enhance the school experience for all students.

- Collaborate with school captains, administration, and committee chairpersons to propose, plan, and implement student-led initiatives that promote a positive school culture.
- Engage with students across year levels to gather ideas, feedback, and foster inclusivity in decision-making.
- Facilitate fundraising activities, student events, and service projects, creating an annual events calendar to organize and streamline committee– led events.

3. Sport Captains

- Assist in the organization and running of sports events, including training sessions, carnivals, tournaments, and lunchtime sporting activities.
- Motivate and lead teams in competitions, demonstrating and fostering good sportsmanship.
- Collaborate with HPE staff to develop school-wide health and fitness initiatives, and volunteer at school carnivals, interschool competitions, district events, and primary school visits as needed.
- Help organize and MC the annual Sports Awards Ceremony, delivering sports updates at assemblies.

- Assist in the organisation and running of music events, including rehearsal sessions, functions, showcases, and lunchtime music activities.
- Motivate and lead groups in competitions.
- Collaborate with Arts staff to develop school-wide music initiatives, and volunteer at school events, functions, showcases, and primary school visits as needed.

10. Co-curricular Leadership Positions

Role Summary:

Co-Curricular Captains at Bray Park State High School are leaders within their respective areas of Tech Crew, Music Ensembles, Volleyball, Innovate and Dance. They inspire and encourage participation, dedication, and collaboration, helping students develop their skills while fostering a sense of community. These captains work closely with teachers and other student leaders to organise, support, and represent their co-curricular programs within the school and at external events.

Responsibilities:

- Act as a role model within the co-curricular program, guiding and supporting peers in skill development and engagement.
- Communicate information to students within their co-curricular area.
- Encourage students to join and actively participate in co-curricular activities, promoting a positive and inclusive environment.
- Assist teachers and staff in planning, preparing, and executing co-curricular events, performances, and competitions.
